Minimum Requirements for Recognition of a Nurses Training Centre/Institute for the SRN Course in General Nursing and Midwifery

I. Rules for Recognition

A. Training

An Institution applying for recognition as a Nurses' Training Centre (NTC) to train basic nurses must satisfy to the Council that it provides training in nursing in accordance with the Syllabus of Training laid down by the Bangladesh Nursing Council from time to time and meets the following criteria.

B. Inspection

An Institution applying for recognition should be inspected by two or three persons appointed by the Council. Institutions should be liable for periodic reinspection at intervals of not greater than 5 years.

C. Periodical Returns

Every institution recognised as a training centre by the Council should submit to the Council yearly returns.

II. Administration of the NTC

A. Head of Institution

The administrative head should be the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge whose responsibilities should include planning, organising directing, supervising, and coordinating the nursing educational programme in the NTC. The NTC administrative head is locally resposible to Director/Superintendent of the hospital and ultimately to the Director of Nursing Services.

B. Budget

Each NTC should have a separate budget and the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge should be the drawing and disbursing officer and should plan for managing the funds in the different components as per GOB rules and as deemed necessary for running an educational institution.

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C. Records

The following records should be maintained by the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge:

- Admission Book which should contain all information on student admission, progression and graduation for termination)
- 2. Leave Book
- 3. Study Day Class Attendance Record
- 4. Clinical Practice Attendance Record
- 5. Internal Exams Results
- 6. BNC Exams Results
- 7. Student Personal File
- 8. Stock Ledgers (furniture, crockeries, equipment, books, etc.)
- 9. Book Lending Record

D. Student Health Services

The following health services should be arranged for students:

- 1. Annual medical examination
- 2. Vaccination against prevalent communicable diseases as considered necessary
- 3. Free medical care during certified illness
- 4. Complete individual health record
- 5. Separate unit/bed in the hospital for sick students along with an improved diet.

III. Teaching Staff

A. Number

- The ratio of teaching staff to students should be 1 Sister Tutor for 25 students for theoretical classes and 1 Sister Tutor for 15 students for clinical instruction/supervision. The actual numbers should be as follows:
 - a- A NTC attached to a Medical College Hospital with enrollment of 200 students (annual intake of 50 students)

Principal — 1 (one)

Sister Tutors -- 8 (eight)

Clinical Instructors - 13 (thirteen)

 A NTC attached to a District Hospital with enrollment of 80-100 students (annual intake of 20-25 students)

Sister Tutor In-Charge - 1 (one)

Sister Tutors - 3 (three)

Clinical Instructors- 6 (six)

- For every additional 25 students, 1 Sister Tutor should be added for theoretical classes and 1 Sister Tutor for clinical instruction.
- Guest Lecturers may be arranged provided they are qualified in the subjects
 they teach.

B. Qualifications

The qualifications of nursing and other teaching staff of the NTCs should be in accordance with GOB recruitment rules. Specific qualification preferences are as follows:

- 1. Principal Master's Degree in Nursing (or Nursing Education) with a minimum of 5 years of teaching experience and 3 years of clinical experience or in Nursing or Public Health (Basic or Post Basic) with 8 years of teaching experience and 3 years of clinical experience or Diploma in Teaching and Administration with 10 years of teaching experience and 5 years of clinical experience.
- Sister Tutor In-Charge—B. Sc. in Nursing of Public Health Nursing (Basic or Post-Basic) with 3 years of teaching experience and 3 years of clinical experience or Diploma in Teaching and Administration with 5 years of teaching experience and 3 years of clinical experience.
- Sister Tutor B. Sc. in Nursing or Public Health Nursing (Basic or Post Basic)
 with 3 years of clinical experience or Diploma in Teaching & Administration
 with 5 years of clinical experience.
- Clinical Instructor Diploma in Teaching or a post basic course (1 year or longer) in a specialised subject with 5 years of clinical experience. Preference shall be given to candidates with B. Sc in Nursing or Public Health Nursing (Basic or Post Basic).
- The nursing teaching staff should include at least 1 (one) Sister Tutor who is prepared in Public Health Nursing.
- Guest Lecturer Specialised and experienced in the subject matter, Teaching experience preferred.

IV. Additional Staff

A. Number

The number of administrative, clerical and maintenance staff should be in accordance with the Government sanctioned posts allocated for each NTC. The actual numbers should be as follows:

- 1. Housekeeper 1 (one)
- 2. U. D. Asst 1 (one)
- 3. L. D. Cum Typist 1 (one)



- 4. Cashier 1 (one)
- 5. Driver-1 (one)
- 6. Daftary 1 (one)
- 7. Cook 2 (two)
- Mashalchi 2 (two)
- 9. Table boy 2 (two)
- 10. Darwan 3 (three)
- 11. Sweeper 3 (three)
- 12. MLSS 4 (four)
- 13. Librarian-1 (one)
- Storekeeper 1 (one)

V. Physical Facilities of NTC

A. Academic Facilities

The NTC should have a separate building (*) with the following minimum academic facilities:

- Classrooms There should be at least 4 Lecture rooms in NTCs attached to Medical College Hospitals and 2 Lecture rooms in NTCs attached to District Hospitals. Each Lecture room should have a seating capacity to accommodate the annual intake of students per class. The rooms should be well ventilated and properly lighted and should have built in/portable blackboards.
- 2. Laboratories There should be at least 2 Demonstration rooms in NTCs attached to Medical College Hospitals and 1 Demonstration room in NTCs attached to District Hospitals for nursing practice. Each Demonstration room should be large enough to accommodate 1 bed per 10 students in a class and should be properly equipped with hand washing facilities and necessary supplies and equipment for clinical teaching/practice.
- 3. Library—There should be 1 room for storage and use of textbooks and reference materials. It should be large enough to seat 1/3 of the total numbers of students enrolled and staff, have comfortable seating arrangements, be well lighted, and have sufficient number of up-to-date books and journals.
- 4. Offices There should be 1 office with attached toilet for the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge, a sufficient number of other offices with attached toilets, each to be shared by 2 Sister Tutors, and a separate office(s) for the administrative/clerical staff.
- Store Room—There should be 1 room for storing office supplies and 1 room for storing teaching equipment and materials.

 Other — Adequate provisions should be made for toilets and drinking water in the academic side of all NTCs, an exam hall/auditorium in NTCs attached to Medical College NTCs, and a room designated for conferences and meetings in all NTCs.

B. Hostel Facilities

The NTC should provide minimum hostel facilities as follows:

- Bedrooms There should be sufficient number of bedrooms in which no more
 than 4 students are accommodated. Each room should be well-ventilated and well
 lighted. The furniture should include separate sleeping, study/scating and
 storage provisions for each student such as bed cot, dressing table, desk and
 chair per 2 students, and a wall mirror.
- Bathing and Toilet facilities—There should be a sufficient number of toilets and bathrooms on each floor so that there is 1 toilet and one bath per 4 students and separate wash basins.
- Dininig Room There should be at least 1 dining room, which is large enough
 and with a table/seating capacity to accommodate 1/2 of the total students at one
 time. Hand washing facilities should be provided near-by.
- Kitchen There should be at least 1 kitchen which is well-vertilated and welllighted and equipped with washing, cooling, and storage facilities,
- Visitor's Room There should be at least 1 room with comfortable seating arrangements and toile: facilities where students can entertain their visitors.
- Common Room There should be at least 1 room for recreational uses, meetings, and general purposes.
- There should be 2 guest rooms with attached bathrooms and toilets to accommodate official visitors.
- There should be facilities for indoor recreational activities in the common room and outdoor recreational activities in the NTC compound.

C. Minimum Accommodation

The NTC should provide the minimum accommodation for students, nursing teaching staff, and housekeeper as follows:

- 1. Student total hostel space amounting to 180 sft. per student,
- Principal 1 separate quarter of 1,000 sft.
- 3. Sister Tutor 1 separate quarter of 800 sft, for each.
- Housekeeper—1 separate quarter of 600 sft.

D. Other Facilities

- 1. The NTC should have a vehicle(s) and garage for storage,
- The NTC building (s) should be surrounded by a high boundary wall with a locking gate and all open passageways should be protected by adequate grillwork to ensure security of students and staff.

VI. Clinical Facilities

A. Hospital

- Size There should be a minimum of 100 beds to provide adequate clinical learning experiences as specified in the SRN syllabus for the students in the NTC. The average daily bed occupancy rate should be not less than 80.
- 2. Types of patient services-There should be adequate services so that the hospital has a variety of patients of all age groups at different stages of illness in all clinical areas to provide students with appropriate clinical learning experiences. These services should include inpatient beds for medical, surgical, paediatric, gynaecology, maternity, Eye, and ENT patients: operation theatre and out door department for MCH & FP, paediatric and medical-surgical patients. There should be adequate toilets, sitting and dining space and bedside furniture for the patients.
- 3. Number of Nursing Staff—The number of nursing staff required will vary depending on the types of patient services provided. The actual numbers are based on ratios of nurses to hospital beds to cover all three shifts as follows:
 - a. 1 Senior Staff Nurse : 4 general beds
 - b. 1 Senior Staff Nurse : 2 specialty beds
 - c. 2 Senior Staff Nurse : each O. T. room
 - d. 1 Senior staff Nurse : each Outpatient Department
 - e. 1 Supervising Sister : 2 hospital wards
 - f. 1 Matron (Sr) Matron (Jr) or Sister In-Charge of the Hospital
- Qualifications of Nursing Staff should be in accordance with GOB recruitment rules.
- There should be adequate office space, a nurse's duty room and utility room, toilets and security provisions for nurses and students.
- Equipment, instruments and supplies should be adequate to provide the requisite practical training in accordance with the prescribed syllabus.

B. Community

- Facilities-Near-by community services should be selected according to their capacity to provide community oriented learning experiences as outlined in the SRN curriculum. Where no such services exist, field practice areas may be developed in the Outpatient Department of Upazila Health Complexes.
- Transport—the NTC vehicle should be used to transport the students to and from the community/field experiences.
- Accommodation If extended stay is required, adequate, safe accommodations for students and Sister Tutor (s) should be arranged.

C. Affiliation Arrangements

When all required clinical experiences can not be provided in the parent NTC and hospital complex and near-by community settings, the NTC should arrange to affiliate with another institution. A formal arrangement should be made which clearly indicates the purpose, expected activities, and responsibilities of the affiliation.

D. Community Experiences

The preferred arrangements for community-oriented learning experiences is for groups of students (10-15 at a time) to spend periodic blocks of 3-4 weeks in community settings rather than single day field trips.

RULES FOR EXAMINATION BY THE NURSING COUNCIL

I. Scheme of BNC Examinations

A. Number

- PTS—An examination should be held at the end of the 12-week Preliminary Training School (PTS) period. This exam should be prepared by the BNC and administered and graded locally.
- Year-End The BNC should conduct annually at the end of each year of study an
 examination consisting of written, oral and practical parts covering the subjects
 taught in the year. Each year end examination should be given after the completion of 11 months of training (excluding one month annual leave).
- Supplementary The BNC should conduct annually a supplementary examination
 for those students who failed the year-end examination 6 weeks after the results of
 the year-end examination are published.

B. Marking System for Papers

1. The following should be the marking system for the year-end BNC examinations :

2. The written examinations in the First and Second Years should include 70 percent essay and 30 percent objective type questions. In the Third and Fourth year written examinations, the questions should be 60 percent essay and 40 percent objective with the exception of the English written examination which should be 75 percent essay and 25 percent objective.

C. Eligibility for the BNC Examinations

- A student should be eligible to appear for the year-end examination upon meeting the following requirements:
 - a. attended 80 percent of the Study Days
 - satisfactorily performed 80 percent of the nursing skills specified in the Nursing Skills Checklist for the year covered by the examination (See Annex B)
 - c. passed with 50 percent mark an institutional examination which is
 - conducted at least two (2) months prior to the BNC examination,
 - 2) includes written, oral and practical parts,
 - 3.) covers all subjects taught in the year, and
 - consists of the same type and percentage of essay and objective questions as are on the BNC examination for that year.

II. Administration of BNC Examinations.

A. Application

 Application for the examination should be submitted at least one month prior to the examination to the Registrar of the Council on the prescribed from obtained form the Council.

- The application form along with the prescribed fee should be submitted through
 the NTC after the form has been duly signed by the Principal/Sister Tutor
 In-Charge certifying eligibility.
- 3. Fees for the examinations should be laid down by the Council.
- A late fee along with the prescribed examination fee should be paid by those students who submit their applications after the appointed date.
- 5. Notice of a student's withdrawal should reach the Registrar two weeks before the examination is due to be he'd. Otherwise the examination fee will be forfeited except in the case of a student who is prevented from appearing by illness and produces a certificate to that effect signed by the Director/Superintendent of the hospital. In cases of withdrawal in time and illness, the examination fee is held for the next scheduled examination.

B. Conduct of the Examinations

- The language of the examinations should be the same as the medium of instruction, i.e. English and Bengali.
- 2. The Council should appoint the examination centres.
- The invigilators for the examinations should be appointed by the examination centres according to the following Council regulations:
 - a. Written Part—1 Invigilator for upto 20 students and 2 Invigilators for upto 30 students
 - b Practical/Oral Parts 1 Invigilator for each subject each day
- 4. If a student is observed during the examination of using any unfair method i e. copying from another student's paper or notes, the student is given a warning, her script is taken away, and she must start over again with a new question paper. The BNC is notified by the Presiding Officer of the event. If the same student is observed again using unfairness, her script is taken away, and she is not allowed to continue with the examination. The BNC is notified by the Presiding Officer, and the BNC will decide on the final action to be taken.

III. Examination Results

A. Distribution

Printed copies of the results of the examinations showing the marks should be sent to the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge of the respective NTCs.

B. Grading

- The pass mark for each examination should be 50 percent of each of the written, bral, and prectical parts of the papers.
- 2. 5 grace marks on the aggregate score may be granted by the BNC.

C. Reappearance

- A student failing the PTS examination should be given one chance for re-examination after 4 weeks of further training. A student failing the re-examinations hould be dismissed from the NTC.
- A student failing any papers on a year-end examination, may sit for the classes/supplementary BNC examination provided that the student has completed revision assignments.
- When appearing for the supplementary BNC examination, the student should only repeat those papers which the student failed in the year-end BNC examination.
- A student failing any papers she is repeating in the supplementary BNC examination should repeat the entire year in those subjects only.

D. Registration

Students, after passing the final examinations in nursing and midwifery should apply for respective registrations by submitting to the Council the application form along with a photograph and testimonial attested by the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge, This testimonial should certify that the student has completed the prescribed training programme, including passing marks and satisfactory behaviour and character.

SRN SYLLABUS GUIDELINES

I. Course of Study

A. Period of Training

There should be a minimum period of four years of training (3 years of general nursing and 1 year of midwifery or equivalent) including 3 months in PTS. No candidate should be allowed to appear in the final examination for general nursing or the final examination in midwifery (or equivalent) unless she has completed the prescribed period; the period of leave over and above the leave admissable under the normal rules should be made up before appearing for the final examinations,

B. Major Subject Areas

Theoretical instruction and clinical/community practices experiences should be in the areas of 1) Basic and Behavioural Sciences applied to Nursing, 2) English, 3) Community-oriented Nursing, 4) Clinical Nursing in Hospitals, and 5) Midwifery or equivalent.

C. Medium of Instruction

The training should be given in English and Bengali,

D. Certification

Upon passing the final Bangladesh Nursing Council (BNC) examinations, graduates should receive a Diploma in Nursing Science and Midwifery (or an equivalent).

II. Admission of Students

A. Minimum Requirements

- 1. Bangladesh citizenship
- 16-26 years of age according to original birth certificate, special affidavit for age certification not accepted
- 3. Secondary School Certificate (SSC) pass in not less than 2nd Division
- 4. Unmarried
- 5. Medical certificate of physical fitness

B. Selection Board

- 1. Principal/Sister Tutor-in-Charge of the Nurses' Training Centre (NTC)
- 2. Matron/Sister in-Charge of the Hospital
- 3. Medical Director/Superintendent of the Hospital/Civil Surgeon
- 4. Sister Tutor of the NTC
- 5. Divisional Assistant Director of Nursing Services
- 6. District PHN
- 7. Guest Lecturer

C. Mode of Selection

- Passing mark on written general knowledge exam prepared by BNC but administered and graded locally
- 2. Personal interview to determine suitability and motivation for nursing
- 3. 2 references from local authorities and government officers

III. Administrative Requirements for the Syllabus

A. Records

The following records should be maintained by the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge :

- Admission Book which should contain all information on student admission, progression and graduation (or termination)
- 2. Leave Book
- 3. Study Day Class Attendance Record
- 4. Clinical Practice Attendance Record
- 5. Internal Exams Results
- 5. BNC Exams Results
- 7. Student Personal File
- 8. Stock Ledgers (furniture, crockeries, equipment, books, etc.)
- 9. Book Lending Record

B. Committees

The following committees should be organized and should meet regularly in each Nurses Training Centre on relevant matters pertaining to the nurses, training programme:

- 1. Faculty, including Sister Tutors, Clinical Instructors, and Guest Lecturers
- 2. Student Nurses
- Mess
- 4. Recreation

C. Conferences

Conferences involving the following groups should be held regularly on relevant matters pertaining to the nurses' training programme:

- 1. Faculty, including Sister, Tutors, Clinical Instructors, and Guest Lecturers
- Faculty Matrons/Ward Sister and Student Nurses
- Faculty, Representatives from community field practice sites, end Student Nurses
- Principal/Sister Tutor In Charge, Civil Surgeon, Medical Director/Superintendent, Medical College Principal (if relevant), and Matron/Sister In-Charge.

D. Students

- Residence—Student nurses may be permitted to reside outside the hostel up to the discretion of the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge.
- 2. Health The following health services should be provided for students :
 - a. annual medical examination
 - b. vaccination against prevalent communicable diseases as considered necessary
 - c. free medical care during certified illness
 - d. complete individual health record
 - e. separate unit/bed in the hospital for sick students along with an improved diet
- Males—Instead of Gynae wards, a male student should spend at least three months in any of other speciality departments such as psychiatric, orthopaedic, physio therapy, emergency, X-ray, laboratory, etc.
- 4. Transfer—A student may transfer from one recognised NTC to another during her training, provided the arrangement is agreed upon and approved and ordered by the Directorate of Nursing Services.

E. Library

Each NTC should have library facilities which are available and easily accesible
to students. For this purpose, senior students may be assigned on a rotating basis
to monitor the library after 14.00 or students should be allowed to sign out
books for use after 14:00 in their own rooms or in a study hall.

IV. Distribution of Hours

A. Instruction/Practice and Time-off Periods

 Each year, 42 weeks should be allocated for theoretical instruction and clinical/community field practice experiences. Each week should comprise 6 days since students should have one (1) day off per week. The following time-off periods for students should be granted:

Annual Leave 4 weeks
Official holidays (days vary according to official calendar) 2 weeks
Pre BNC Exam preparation 1 week
BNC Exam period 3 weeks
TOTAL 10 weeks

- The time-off periods should be scheduled by the Principal/Sister Tutor In-Charge according to the Study Day and Clinical/Community Rotation Plans and local hospital staffing needs so that some students should be available at all times for clinical practice experiences in the hospital wards.
- 3. Whenever possible, official holiday time-off should be arranged on students' Clinical Practice Days to avoid having students miss Study Days. An exception to this is the week long Eid holidays when no Study Days should be scheduled so that students who are not given time-off may be scheduled for ward clinical practice.
- 4. The BNC Pre-exam and Exam periods should also be scheduled in a staggered manner so that all students are not having time-off at the same time. Forexample, First and Third year-end exams may be held together and after a one-two week gap Second and Fourth Year-end exams may be held.
- Students should be considered absent from duty for any leave taken over and above these designated periods and should make up this time before appearing for the final examinations.

B. Weekly Schedule

Each week the students' schedule should be organized as follows:
 Study Days-2 days per week (6 hours per day for all theoretical instruction classes and supervised demonstrations/study periods, including lecture/discussions, small group projects, assigned library work, and nursing skills practice in the Demonstration Room.

Clinical Practice Days - 4 days per week (6 hours per.day) for all clinical practice learning experiences in hospital and community field settings, including field trips and observations.

2. The Study and Clininical Practice Days (See Annex A) should be different for each year of students to promote uninterrupted teaching/learning activities on Study Days and to insure adequate numbers of students on the hospital wards. On any given day during the week, 2 Years of students should have Study Day sessions and 2 Years of students should be assigned for clinical practice in the hospital wards and community settings.

C. Yearly Allocation

On the basis of the Study/Clinical Practice Days and Time-off Periods, the year-wise allocation of hours is as follows:

Note: The yearly allocation of hours is different for First Year because of the PTS period during which time students have only theortical instruction/study and no hospital/community practice experiences except for observations and demonstrations. During the 12-week PTS period, only 9 weeks are available for instruction because 1 week is set aside for orientation, 1 week for review for the PTS exam, and 1 week for the exam.

V. Organisation of Courses

A. Year-wise Content Areas

The following conceptual organisation of the curriculum should guide the students, study day activities and clinical practice experiences in each year:

1. First Year-the focus is on heathly human functioning to promote and maintain people's health within the biological physical and scoio-cultural environment in which people live. Thus the courses emphasize applied scientific principles in nursing, social and behavioural concepts, and basic nursing knowledge, skills and attitudes which students apply in caring for the basic health needs of individuals in general hospital settings Students' introduction to community nursing focuses on the relationship between community environment and people's health: how environmental factors contribute to health and disease and how people can modify environmental factors to promote health and prevent disease.

- 2. Second Year- the focus changes to promotion and maintenance of family health, specific disease prevention, and more advanced nursing care to promote recovery and restoration of health of ill adults and children who have common health problems. Courses emphasize PHC concepts and strategies and essential community-oriented and clinical nursing knowledge, skills and attitudes which students apply in family health care, especially with mothers and children and in adult and child medical-surgical care situations.
- 3. Third Year— the focus shifts to health promotion and maintenance and disease prevention for special target populations and community groups, health restoration and rehabilitation for adults with complex health problems and heginning leadership roles. Courses emphasize epidemiological, organisational and management principles and specialised nursing knowledge and skills which students apply in assuming greater responsibility for managing, coordinating, and providing community-oriented and advanced nursing care.
- 4. Fourth Year—the total focus is on Midwifery in which students add to their general nursing background the specialized knowledge, skills and attitudes in Institutional and Domiciliary Midwifery, Obstetrical Nursing, Family Planning and Neonatal Nursing for caring for mothers and newborns in hospital and community settings.

VI. Clinical/Community Field Practice Experiences

A Practice Areas

Students should be assigned to hospital and community settings for observations and practice related to the objectives of the course they are currently studying, what they are learning in the classroom, and what they are practising in the demonstration laboratory. The following is the break-up of hours for the practical experiences according to the Clinical Rotation Plan (See Annex A) and Suggested Clinical Practice Experiences in the individual course outlines:

B. Night Duty

- A certain amount of night duty is essential for learning purposes, but night duty should be limited considering the maturity level of the students, safety of the patients, and security in the hospital at night,
- 2. First Year students should not be assigned to night duty. Second, Third, and Fourth Year students should be assigned night duty upto 60 nights in a single year. During a year, this would mean that, on the average, second, third, and fourth year students should be assigned night duty for 15 consecutive nights every three months.
- One staff nurse should be assigned to the hospital ward s) to supervise students when they are on night duty.

VII. Instructional Methodology

A. Teaching/Learning Activities

The following methods should be used for Study Day classes in the NTCs to promote active learning:

- 1. Group Discussion
- 2. Small Group Assignments or Projects
- 3. Demonstrations and Return Demonstrations
- 4. Assigned Library Work or Reading
- 5. Use of Audio-Visual Aids
- 6. Patient Case Presentations

Clinical Practice Experiences

- The following activities should be used for hospital and community experiences
 - a. Field Trips
 - b. Individual Patient Assignments
 - c. Ward Task Assignments
 - d. Written Nursing Care Plans
- Rotation Plans for hospital and community experiences should be prepared in consultation with hospital nursing and community field personnel.

Teachers and Examiners

- Lectures in special subjects should be given by qualified persons or specialists, i. e. registered medical doctors, specialists or consultants, public health nurse etc.
- Examinations in special subjects should be conducted by two examiners in each subject, i. e. medical doctors if available or qualified nurses.
- All Guest Lecturers who deliver lectures according to the SRN Syllabus should be paid remuneration from a separate budget provided to the NTC.

Evaluation

- Evaluation of students' progress in theoretical instruction and performance
 in the practical areas should be a continuous process. Sister Tutors and guest
 Lecturers should carry out frequent and regular examinations in each subject
 and Sister Tutors and hospital nursing personnal should use observational
 checklists to evaluate the students, performance of nursing skills according to
 the year- wise break-up in the Nursing Skills Checklist.
- The NTC should follow the rules for examinations regarding PTS, year end, and supplementary examinations.
